Progress reports will be sent home with students once per quarter, and teachers will communicate with parents through ParentLink. Parents of incoming ninth graders will be invited to meet with members of the Guidance department in the spring prior to their ninth grade year to discuss their child's academic needs and plan for high school courses. Parents will be given a Program of Studies at this time and will have the opportunity to ask questions and provide input into their child's course requests.

All parents are invited to join the SAC during the Open House, through newsletter articles and ParentLink messages. At SAC, parents can make suggestions/decisions that will positively impact the school. Any comments from parents about the Parent Involvement Plan will be forwarded to the Title I office.
